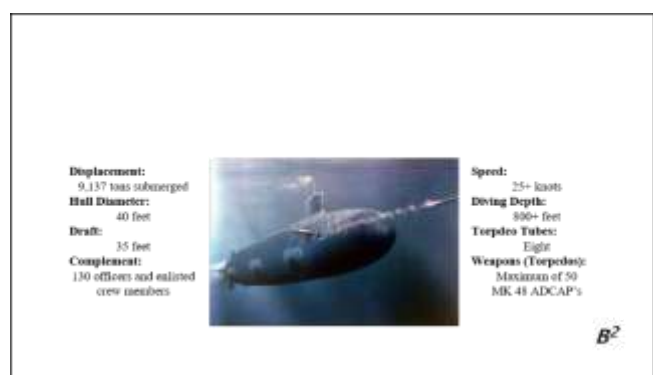
## Here and There

In 1924 the US Congress passed the Kelley Act also known as the Air Mail Act of 1924, authorizing the USPS to contract with commercial air carriers to transport the mail. CAM-1 was established to transport mail from New York City (Newark Field) to Boston with an intermediate stop in Hartford, CT[1]. Covers associated with this route are known as CAM-1 covers. On 9 Feb 1934 the postmaster general cancelled all domestic commercial air mail contracts within the US to be effective 19 Feb 1934. At the same time President Franklyn Roosevelt issued an executive order that the US Army Air Corps would carry all domestic air mail until new contracts could be established. The new contracts were awarded in May with service to start in late June 1934. So the experiment with the Army Air Corps Air Mail Service was short lived as it operated for less than 4 months. The cover pictured below was flown on the last flight out of Newark, NJ, bound for Boston. It is franked with the 1916 1 ¢ imperf, Sc # 481 (best guess) paying the 8 ¢ domestic air-mail rate in effect in Feb 1934. LBS (Leo B Schuyler) is the plate finishers initial and BIA records[2] indicate he was the plate finisher for the imperf stamps of 1916 confirming that it is Sc # 481. These stamps were used as postage for many years by collectors and dealers alike. Perham C. Nahl was a prominent air-mail cover collector and 1985 editor of American Air Mail Catalog.

USPB #16361, 19 Feb 1934 announced the US Army would perform air mail service on Route A.M. 1 eff 20 Feb 1934.

The last scheduled CAM 1 service was New York – Boston scheduled for departure from Newark, NJ at 1930, 19 Feb 1934. Arrival time at Boston was scheduled for 2130, 19 Feb 1934.

If schedule was adhered to the cover illustrated would have been carried on last CAM 1 scheduled flight. The southbound flight was scheduled to depart Boston at 1845 and arrive at Newark at 2100, 19 Feb 1934.
