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Cover of the Month

Cover from Middletown to Harrisville, Medina County, OH. Mailed on May 26 1823. Falls under the Postal Act of Apr 9 1816, effective May 1 1816. 25 ¢ over 400 mi. As typical of the time red pencil manuscript 25 indicating postage paid. Struck with a lovely oval Middletown, CONN with fleuron on either side of CONN. Used from 1822-1842. James S. Redfield and his brother William C. Redfield of Middletown, CT were the sons of Peleg and Elizabeth Pratt Redfield of Middletown. James and his wife Mary relocated to Harrisville a part of Lodi in Medina, OH in 1811. They were one of the first families to settle in the region. James opened the first dry goods store in Harrisville in 1820 and was the first mail carrier in Medina County. His brother William remained in Middletown and was a noted meteorologist and discoverer of the dinosaur tracks in the region. In the letter the brothers are anticipating a visit home to Middletown in the summer and the price of hogs on the market in 1823. At the time, a top hog brought 3.5 ¢/lb. and was worth about \$7.70 which is worth \$194.25 in today's currency. The contents of these letters and researching the sender and recipient provided new insights into CT postal History. The town cancels are noteworthy as they were made from wood blocks and have a collecting following on their own. Many CT fancy cancels, straight line town cancels and town ovals are highly collectable. The American Stampless Cover Catalogue Vol. 1, 4th edition, 1985 lists the Middletown oval at \$30.
