This month's featured cover is an interesting example of modern postal history. The $44 \, \phi$ first-class rate was in effect from 11 May 2009 - 21 Jan 2012. This cover was mailed on 15 May 2009 early in the rate period. It is franked with a $42 \, \phi$ flag at dawn coil, Scott # 4234, with plate # P1111 printed by Ashton Potter. The $44 \, \phi$ rate is made up with the $2 \, \phi$ Navajo Necklace sheet stamp, Scott # 3750. The cover exhibits additional postal innovations at the time including a spray on cancel noting the post office, Trenton, NJ processing center. There is also a spray-on zip + 4 barcode applied by the optical scanner that processed the cover. The cover has a Mex-Mail label announcing the birth of a grandchild on 9 Apr 2009 and an interesting fantasy cachet of an amazing tree house. Note the flying boat that accompanies the address. The Sikorsky S-42 flying boat was the airplane

that opened the pacific to both mail and passenger service from San Francisco to Hawaii, Wake Is, Manila, and Hong Kong. S-42 was a production aircraft with four 700 hp. (522 kW) Pratt & Whitney Hornet S5D1G radial engines, three built: NC 822M, NC 823M, NC 824M. The aircraft NC 823M is shown arriving in Honolulu on 17 Apr 1935, piloted by Ed Musick, Pan Am's premier pilot. The arrival marked the opening of transpacific flight. Over the years the aircraft would set world records for load, speed, range and altitude over its 10-year life span.
