
Here and There

Sail Training Ship Horst Wessel (foreground) and Gorch Fock at pier in Bremen, Germany sometime after 1936. Horst Wessel was constructed by shipbuilders Blohm & Voss at Hamburg in 1936 and was commissioned in to the German Navy on 17 September 1936. She was constructed because German military leaders need more officers trained in seamanship skills. Both Horst Wessel and Gorch Fock trained naval cadets from 1936 to 1945. Who was Horst Wessel and why name a sailing ship after an obscure individual with no ties to military or sailing tradition? Horst Wessel was a Nazi party member and a youth leader in the paramilitary *Sturmabteilung* ("Storm Detachment" or SA) of the Nazi Party. In 1929, Wessel wrote the lyrics to "*Die Fahne hoch!*" ("Raise the Flag!"), which would later be known as the "Horst Wessel Song" and became the Nazi Party's anthem. In 1930, he was shot by Communist Party thugs in a dispute over apartment rents. Goebbels later made him a Party hero and named a ship named after him in 1936. In 1946 CDR Gordon McGowan of the US Coast Guard was ordered to Bremerhaven, Germany to take possession of the Horst Wessel, refurbish her, and bring her back to New London as USCG ship Eagle. Eagle arrived in New London on July 12, 1946, and has been homeported here since (77 years). I recently purchased the card above at NAPEX show earlier this year. Unfortunately it was not mailed.
