HISTORY OF THE MANY USS VIRGINIA'S

USS Virginia (1776), was a 28-gun sailing frigate built in 1776, captured by the British in the following year and recommissioned as HMS Virginia USS Virginia (1797), was a 14-gun revenue cutter built in 1797 and returned to the Revenue Cutter

in 180 USS Virginia (1825), was a 74-gun ship of the line laid down in 1818 but never launched, and broken up

on the stocks in 1874

On the stocks in 1614 (1961), was a captured Spanish <u>blackade runner</u> during the American Civil War and commissioned into the United States' Navy USS *Virginia* (BB-13), was a <u>Virginia-class battleship</u> commissioned in 1906, decommissioned in 1920,

and destroyed in 1923 as a bombing target

USS Virginia (SP-274), was a working urgan USS Virginia (SP-274), was a yacht purchased by the Navy and officially referred to only as SP-274, patrollel Lake Michigan during World War I USS Virginia (SP-746), was a motorboat acquired by the Navy and officially referred to only as SP-746, patrolled the east coast during World War I USS Virginia (SP-166), where the motorboat acquired by the Navy and officially referred to only as SP-746, patrolled the east coast during World War I

DSS Virginia (SP-1965), was a two-masted auxiliary schooner acquired by the Navy and officially referred to only as SP-1965, patrolled the east ecost during World War I USS Irrginia (CGN-38), was a Virginia-class gruiser commissioned in 1976 and decommissioned in 1994

USS Virginia (SSN-774), is a Virginia-class submarine commissioned in 2004
